

Fire Drill - Resident Briefing Guide

Before running a fire drill, take a few minutes to give residents a simple safety talk. This helps them understand the building's fire systems and what to do in an emergency. A quick briefing boosts participation and helps everyone stay calm and safe.

QUICK OVERVIEW: BUILDING LIFE SAFETY FEATURES

Explain each feature and its purpose:

- ✓ Smoke Alarms Local alarms in suites and common areas.
- ✓ **Secondary Smoke Detection** For specific BCH facilities.
- ✓ Heat Detectors Located in suites and service spaces.
- ✓ Fire Alarm System Single-stage operation.
- ✓ Alarm Monitoring Alerts external monitoring service.
- ✓ Voice Communication Instructions via speakers.
- ✓ Pull Stations Manual alarm activation.
- ✓ Sprinkler System Automatic fire suppression.
- ✓ Fire Doors Prevent fire/smoke spread.
- ✓ Exit Corridors/Stairwells Safe evacuation routes.
- ✓ Fire Extinguishers For small fires.
- ✓ Hose Stations For trained personnel.
- ✓ Standpipes Water supply for firefighting.
- ✓ Emergency Lights Illuminate exits during power loss.

DID YOU KNOW? 2024 FIRE STATISTICS (Source: Office of Fire Commissioner)

- √ 9,884 fires reported.
- √ 269 injuries, 61 deaths.
- ✓ Top causes: Cooking, lighters/matches, candles, and smoking

QUICK OVERVIEW: WHEN EVACUATING...

- ✓ Activate the fire alarm.
- ✓ Do NOT use elevators.
- ✓ Walk calmly, close doors behind you.

- ✓ Leave walkers in suites to keep exits clear.
- ✓ Use alternate exits if smoke is present.
- ✓ Stay low if smoke is encountered.
- ✓ Crawl downstairs if needed.
- ✓ If exits are unsafe: return to suite, close door, call 911.
- ✓ Go to the common meeting area and wait for instructions. Do not re-enter until cleared by the fire department.

QUICK OVERVIEW: IF YOU DISCOVER A FIRE...

- ✓ Activate the alarm via pull station and shout "FIRE!"
- ✓ Call 911 or ask someone to do so.
- ✓ Use a fire extinguisher only if:
- ✓ Fire is small.
- ✓ You are trained.
- ✓ You are not alone.
- ✓ Your escape route is clear.
- ✓ Evacuate using the nearest exit.
- ✓ Close doors behind you.
- ✓ Report to the common meeting area.

IMPORTANT: EVACUATION PLANS FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

- ✓ Residents with disabilities are encouraged to create a PEEP (Personal Emergency Evacuation Plan)
- ✓ Identifies tools or support needed for independent evacuation.
- ✓ Voluntary program contact your Fire Safety Director to arrange.

FINAL REMINDER

✓ Participation in fire drills is strongly encouraged to improve readiness and ensure safety during real emergencies.
