



In emergencies, many tenants in Single Room Occupancy (SRO) housing face barriers to evacuation due to mobility, health, or cognitive challenges. **Most SROs are independent living environments, meaning tenants are expected to self-evacuate—but that's not always possible**.

In developing a PEEP, using the Buddy System can be invaluable, pairing tenants with trusted neighbors who can assist during emergencies helps ensure no one is left behind, especially when time, coordination, and trust are critical.

Key benefits	 Builds trust and community resilience. Fills gaps in emergency response where infrastructure is limited. Supports tenants with disabilities or temporary conditions. Aligns with evolving legal and ethical standards internationally.
Before you begin	 Operators should assess existing life safety systems (e.g., alarms, sprinklers, evacuation chairs) to ensure the Buddy System complements—not replaces—critical infrastructure.
How-to tips	 Identify tenants who may need support. Recruit and train capable, trusted buddies. Match buddies based on proximity, capacity, and availability. Document and update plans regularly. Practice through drills and community engagement.
Backed by research	 Trust and community connection improve emergency response. Delays in evacuation are common. Trusted buddies reduce hesitation. No single strategy works for all—PEEPs and Buddy Systems must be part of a layered safety approach.
The takeaway	 The Buddy System is not just helpful—it's lifesaving. It works best when: Buddies are trained, trusted, and available Plans are documented, practiced, and updated Integrated into a broader strategy—not used in isolation
